Greeks agree on austerity, unions call general strike

ATHENS — Greek political leaders clinched a long-awaited deal on austerity measures to secure a second round of international bailout and avoid a chaotic default, hours before the country's financial markets began trading on Thursday. European Union partners and the International Monetary Fund have been negotiating for a series of broken promises and weeks of wrangling over sacrifices they demanded in return for a €175 billion (US\$240 billion) bailout, with their meeting in Brussels before a major March 10 bond auction.

Finance Minister Dimitris Kourfakis said the deal was a "historic moment" for the country, with the deal involving leaders of the main Greek political parties and chief EU and IMF inspectors. The deal also had an outline deal with private creditors on a bond swap in which they would give up some 70 per cent of the value of their Greek bond holdings, reducing Athens' \$400 billion debt pile by about \$200 billion. ECB president Mario Draghi said the deal was "quite significant" that all the components of a Greek debt deal would fall into place and boost the confidence of the private sector. An IMF spokesperson called the agreement "an important initial step" and said IMF managing director Christine Lagarde, in Brussels for

the surprise meeting, would seek assurances that the policies would be consistent with the outcome of a general election likely in April. The measures will mean a big fall in the living standards of many Greeks, now in the fifth year of a deep recession. Deputy Labour Minister Vassilis Kostasoulas, a socialist, resigned over a package he said would be "punish for working people." Greece's two major labour unions called a 48-hour strike for Friday and Saturday against the reforms. "The painful measures that come with the deal, the unemployed and pensioners do not leave us much room," secretary general of the ANOPE union, Elias Boudoukas, told Reuters. "We won't accept them. There will be a social uprising." Pano Lagaris, spokesman for PANOS socialist union who are in coalition along with the conservative New Democracy party and far-right LAOS, said the leaders had agreed to cut the minimum wage by 22 per cent as part of efforts to make the economy more competitive. Plans to scrap holiday bonuses paid to private sector workers had been dropped. Aides from the different over pension cuts had been reached, a government official told Reuters.
